"I'm off again to try my luck, and no matter what the outcome may be I will, of course, be home for dinner."

But he did not return, nor has he been heard from. However, inquiry at the Eagan home revealed that his wife and mother were still in Philadelphia and rumors at his apartment had it that Eagan was in touch with his relatives yesterday morning.
